

Investigative Journalist Edwin Black will discuss the global energy dilemma at Palm Beach State College

(Palm Beach Gardens, Fla. – Jan. 15, 2010) Journalist and author Edwin Black will discuss the problems of global fossil fuel dependence and possible solutions at Palm Beach State College at Palm Beach Gardens Jan. 27.

Black is an award-winning, *New York Times* bestselling author and international investigative journalist. He is the author of 9 books that have been translated into 14 languages and distributed in 61 countries. His work focuses on genocide and hate, corporate corruption, governmental misconduct, oil addiction and alternative energy.



He has appeared on numerous network broadcasts, including “Oprah”, the “Today Show”, CNN “Wolf Blitzer Reports” and NBC “Dateline.” His works have been the subject of numerous documentaries, here and abroad.

Black’s lecture, titled “The Truth About Oil Addiction and a Plan for the Future,” is drawn from his two latest books, “The Plan” (2008) and “Internal Combustion” (2006).
