Dr. Sass has approved sending out this Emergency Curriculum Committee vote for the following curriculum actions. According to Curriculum Committee policy (1/24/02), the committee has five (5) working days to respond to this email with a vote. The actions will pass or fail based on the number of votes collected by this time. Please review these documents and respond to this e-mail by **April 25th.**

The following curriculum actions need approval:

1.) The BAS in Information Management is adding a Concentration in Project Management. In addition, the BAS in Supervision and Management is adding two concentrations: one in Entrepreneurship and one in Project Management. This action includes the creation of nine new courses and the revision of the two BAS program listings. (See attached agenda item.)

<u>Justification</u>: In today's fast paced technology driven society, employers require a workforce with a combination of skills including technical proficiency, strong communication, team building, and critical thinking, along with the ability to get things done. Organizations must be able to satisfy both internal and external customers in meeting their needs efficiently and effectively. This requires skilled managers who understand the dynamics and interrelationships between scope, time, and cost to deliver competitive products and services. Individuals who can effectively manage innovation, processes, and technology across functional, and sometimes global teams, continue to be in high demand. This demand is not limited to the technology industry. Project management skills are extremely portable and can be applied in every industry.

The FLDOE approved Palm Beach State College's application to offer these BAS concentration effective August 2013 on March 22, 2013. This notice was not in sufficient time to be included in the March 28th Curriculum Committee agenda and therefore needs to be approved now.

2.) The creation of the new Emergency Management AS degree (60 Credits) including the development of four (4) new courses was approved for offering effective August 2013. (See attached agenda item)

<u>Justification</u>: This request is to enhance the level of education to the emergency management profession through the creation of an associate of science degree. The College currently offers a 24 credit certificate in emergency management. The addition of the degree will allow current and future students to continue their education up to the AS, and easily transition to the B.A.S.
