# **Music Cluster (HU 127)**

# ITEM 1. What can faculty do to support the four performance funding measures (job placement or continuing education, completion in 3-4 years, retention, and entry-level wages)?

Discussion:

Allen suggested that in light of having had Music Theory III and Sight-Singing/Ear-Training III cancelled for low enrollment this fall, both retention and completion in 3-4 years have been negatively impacted. If the college will honor a department's "class wheel" and not cancel the classes on the wheel, then this would have a positive impact on these two performance funding measures.

Michael mentioned that better advisement, especially when it comes to the college's A.A. degree programs and their requirements, would have a positive effect on completion in 3-4 years.

Allen pointed out that these measures are sometimes negatively impacted by factors beyond our control. For instance, the traditional mission of the state colleges has included offering educational opportunities to anyone who is a high-school graduate, regardless of grade-point average or SAT/ACT scores. Because we have literally no admission applications rejected on the basis of poor academic records or aptitude, our retention rate cannot compete with a university which has minimum GPA or test-score requirements. Perhaps we should sharpen our efforts to weed out students who do not have the potential for success as music pre-majors, and be more proactive about recommending that they pursue an academic area in which they have demonstrated some degree of aptitude. We already do this to an extent with our orientation sessions and music theory diagnostic pre-tests which for many years have been held on the day prior to the start of classes each term.

In terms of retention and continuing education, we are sometimes penalized for our good efforts, especially when a first-year student succeeds to the point that he transfers to a four-year institution before graduation from PBSC. We have seen many of these cases, especially when reasonably good students decide at the last second to start at PBSC, perhaps because of poor planning, applying to elite institutions where they do not have a good chance of being granted admission, or other reasons. These students "get their act together" during their one semester or one year at PBSC, and transfer before graduating.

We all agree that faculty have little or no control over our students' job placement and entry-level wages.

We decided to spend budget money on spring season mailings to advertise our 2016 spring semester concerts. Michael will investigate through MTIS the possibility of recording more of our concerts and putting some of them on youtube.com, using them for promotional and recruitment purposes, and posting some of

them on the PBSC Music Facebook page.
