

Headcount¹

Spring Term headcount at PBCC had been decreasing since 2004. Headcount dropped by 1.1% from Spring 2004 to Spring 2005 and 9.2% from Spring 2005 to Spring 2006. The trend leveled off in 2007.





Headcount from students enrolled in credit/prep classes remained within a 4.0% range during the four-year period. Headcount from students enrolled in non-credit only classes had been decreasing, but stabilized between 2006 and 2007. As a result, the percentage of all students classified as credit/prep increased from 70.7% to the current level of close to 73.6%. The proportion of non-credit students decreased from 29.3% to 26.4% during the same time frame.


Demographics¹

Race/Ethnicity

The student body has become more diverse since Spring 2004. The Hispanic population has increased the most, growing by 6.5%. Overall, the minority portion of students has grown from 40.1% in 2004 to 42.6% in 2007. The white, non-Hispanic segment has decreased by 14.4% and accounted for 52.9% of the student body during Spring 2007, down from 56.9% during Spring 2004. The black student population has decreased by 7.2% since Spring 2004.






Age


FTE from credit/prep reached a four-year high at 5,282, suggesting that students are taking more credit hours than in earlier years. FTE from non-credit also peaked in 2007; however, a recent change in accounting practices for apprenticeship FTE resulted in a large increase in that category. Therefore, a comparison of non-credit FTE as a category over the years would be inaccurate.

PSAV has rebounded from Spring 2006 by 9.3% and CCE has increased by 18.4%.



Students pursuing an AA degree continue to comprise the largest portion of the student body, with the numbers remaining fairly stable over time. The proportion of these students has grown, however, as the number of students in other categories has decreased. 


Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes on Campus


Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes at all PBCC Campuses Spring Term 2007

Total headcount at PBCC at Lake Worth had been decreasing since 2004. Headcount dropped by 1.9% from Spring 2004 to Spring 2005 and 4.6% from Spring 2005 to Spring 2006. Total headcount leveled off during Spring 2007, dropping by less than 1.0%.





Headcount from students enrolled in credit/prep classes has remained fairly stable since 2004. Headcount from students enrolled in non-credit only classes steadily decreased during the same time period: 3.1% between 2004 and 2005, 10.2% between 2005 and 2006, and 1.2% between 2006 and 2007. As a result, the percentage of all students classified as credit/prep has increased from 62.0% in 2004 to 64.9% in 2007. The proportion of non-credit only students has decreased from 38.0% to 35.1% during the same time period.



Race/Ethnicity

The white non-Hispanic proportion of the student body at Lake Worth dropped below 50.0% for the first time in spring term history, declining 17.2% from Spring 2004. The Hispanic population has increased the most, growing by 5.7% and comprising 19.3% of the student population in 2007. The black student population returned to Spring 2004 levels and accounted for 23.8% of the student population during Spring 2007.






Age

The student body has grown increasingly younger as fewer students over the age of 25 enrolled. Enrollment of 25-to-49 year-olds decreased 14.2% since 2004. 

FTE from non-credit appears to have rebounded in 2007; however, a recent change in accounting practices for apprenticeship FTE resulted in a large increase in that category. Therefore, a comparison of non-credit FTE as a category over the years would be inaccurate.

PSAV had experienced the largest decrease, but rebounded in 2007. CCE experienced the largest non-credit category increase aside from apprenticeship.



Students pursuing an AA degree continue to comprise the largest single portion of the student body, with the numbers very close to 2006 levels. The category of certificates, special diplomas, and teacher prep gained the most students, increasing by 22.2% from 2006.




Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes on Campus


Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes at the PBCC at Lake Worth Campus Spring Term 2007





Headcount from students enrolled in credit/prep classes has declined since Spring 2005. Credit/prep headcount decreased by 2.5% between Spring 2005 and Spring 2006 and by 3.6% between Spring 2006 and Spring 2007. 

Race/Ethnicity

The data suggest that ethnicity has stabilized over the past two spring terms. The Hispanic population has remained at just over ten percent and white non-Hispanics still account for approximately six out of ten students. The black population proportion has remained steady since 2006. Overall, the minority portion of students grew from 36.0% in 2004 to 40.0% in 2006 and then leveled off. Of note is the fact that the percent of students not reporting race remains at over 4.0%.






Age










Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes on Campus


Home Zip Codes of Students Who Took Classes at the PBCC at Belle Glade Center Spring Term 2007

Total headcount at PBCC at Boca Raton decreased by 11.9% between Spring 2005 and Spring 2006, but increased by 2.4% during Spring 2007.









Age


FTE²


