



## **Seminar to help foreign-educated skilled immigrants will be held at Palm Beach State College**

(Lake Worth, Fla. – Jan. 29, 2013) Palm Beach State College is hosting a seminar to help immigrants who earned their college education or professional training in other countries transfer their credentials to the U.S.

The *Pathways to Success*<sup>®</sup> seminar, developed by World Education Services through its Global Talent Bridge initiative, will be held from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Feb. 15 at Stage West at Palm Beach State in Lake Worth, 4200 Congress Ave.

The program will feature a panel of experts who will provide information and resources to help skilled immigrants pursue further education, obtain professional licensing or certification and find suitable employment in the U.S. The event is free and open to all current and recent immigrant students, members of the community, and college and community-based counselors and social services staff who work with immigrants.

Palm Beach State College is teaming up with World Education Services (WES) and the Community College Consortium for Immigrant Education (CCCIE) to hold the seminar. It is in response to Migration Policy Institute data showing that 2.7 million college-educated immigrants in this country are unemployed or under-employed. Foreign-educated immigrants often struggle to find jobs in this country that match their prior education and experience obtained in their home country.

Palm Beach State offers a variety of educational and career resources to assist skilled immigrant students and community members throughout Palm Beach County. The College's Dr. Kathryn W. Davis Global Education Center (GEC) operates as a one-stop education and resource center providing scholarships, acculturation workshops, English language skills, community referrals, and assistance in navigating college programs and services. The GEC, established in 2007, has served over 1,700 immigrant students to date, representing more than 55 countries and including immigrants with varying degrees of formal and/or higher education, according to GEC

Director Jeannett Manzanero, who is coordinating the seminar. Information tables providing College and community resources will also be available.
